DAY 02	Mae Hong Son Sightseeing: Long Neck Karen Village / Su Tong Pe Bamboo Bridge / Ban Rak Thai Chinese Village / Hmong Shan Pa-O Hill Tribe Villages

Embark on a captivating journey from Mae Hong Son city to Huai Suea Tao village, where you will encounter the fascinating Padong or Long Neck Karen Hill tribe. Having migrated from Myanmar to settle in Thailand, the Padong people have preserved a unique tradition of adorning their necks with coiled gold rings. Commencing between the ages of 5 and 9, this practice was initially exclusive to Padong women born on Wednesdays and full moon days but later extended to all Padong women. The solid brass hoops, skillfully bending around the neck like coiled springs, symbolize beauty, status, class, and position within the tribe. Wearing these rings also signifies the importance of marriage. The distinct dress of Padong women, coupled with ancient stories explaining the tradition, sets them apart from other hill tribes in Myanmar.

Journey to Su Tong Pe Bridge, Thailand's longest bamboo bridge and a testament to local ingenuity and tradition. Stretching gracefully across lush paddy fields and tranguil canals, this remarkable structure connects Suan Tham Phusama Temple with the quaint Kung Mai Sak Village, offering both practicality and beauty. The bridge's charm is especially striking during the rainy season when the surrounding fields are a vibrant green or in winter when golden grains shimmer under the sunlight. Framed by majestic mountains, the picturesque landscape enhances the bridge's timeless elegance, making it a favored spot for photography and quiet reflection. As you walk along the gently swaying bamboo planks, the rhythmic sounds of nature surround you, from rustling leaves to the soft murmurs of flowing water. The experience immerses you in the tranquil beauty of Mae Hong Son's countryside, offering a unique perspective of the lush fields and serene waterways. Whether seeking a moment of solitude or capturing the perfect snapshot of rural Thailand, the Su Tong Pae Bridge invites visitors to pause, reflect, and embrace the peaceful rhythm of nature.

Extend your adventure with a visit to Baan Rak Thai village, a picturesque mountain settlement steeped in rich Yunnanese heritage. Established by former members of the Chinese Nationalist 93rd Division who sought refuge in this remote region during the 20th century, Baan Rak Thai has preserved its cultural traditions and culinary artistry, making it a unique gem in northern Thailand. Despite distinct cultural traditions, these three tribes have established a peaceful coexistence. Engaging primarily in agriculture and animal husbandry, their farming endeavors focus on cultivating crops such as cabbage, tomatoes, rice, and beans. The majority of their produce finds its way to city markets. Nestled on the hillsides amidst lush forests and stunning natural surroundings, the villages exude a tranquil charm. The uncomplicated way of life, coupled with the unique cultural practices and beautiful traditions of each tribe, creates an enchanting atmosphere. Visitors are warmly welcomed by the friendly locals, leaving an indelible impression on those who journey through. A highlight of Wat Pong Sunan is the "Phra That Chedi Wiharn Kaew," a striking white temple adorned with 108 pagodas. Inside the viharn, a large Buddha image named "Phra Saraswadee Prathanpon" is enshrined, accompanied by intricate murals depicting various Buddha images in Phrae province and zodiac years. Your exploration continues with a visit to the ancient house, Khum Wong Buri, also known as Ban Wong Buri. This distinctive pink Thai-Lanna house, built over a century ago, stands as a testament to the region's rich cultural heritage and architectural brilliance. Constructed in 1897 by Mae Chao Bua Tha, the first consort of Chao Luang Piriyathepwong, the last ruler of Phrae, the house exudes historical significance and charm. Crafted from golden teak wood, Khum Wong Buri seamlessly combines Thai-Lanna and European styles, reflecting the unique blend of cultural influences that characterized the era. The house employs traditional construction techniques, including intricately stenciled wood patterns that were popular during the reign of King Rama V. With a remarkable 72 windows and doors, each one exquisitely detailed, the house features a Pan-Yah style roof with a rectangular porch that adds to its architectural splendor. Inside Khum Chao Luang, you'll find a treasure trove of historical artifacts and furnishings that offer a glimpse into the lifestyle of Thai nobility in the late 19th century. The house's interior is a testament to the cultural richness and artistic heritage of the period, with each room meticulously preserved to reflect the opulence and elegance of its time. As you wander through this architectural gem, you'll gain a deeper appreciation for the intricate design and historical significance that define Khum Chao Luang.
